On behalf of the 100 Mile Festival of the Arts volunteer Board, I would like to thank the District of 100 Mile House for the \$400 Grant for 2024.

The funds were put toward Adjudicator expenses (4 adjudicators with expenses of \$5083.48)

Our Festival ran from April 9-18, 2024, with students participating in Speech & Dramatic Arts, Piano, Vocal, Instrumental, and for the first time, Dance. 607 people were in attendance throughout the 2 week period of the Festival, and another 192 were in attendance for the Saturday evening Showcase on April 20. The adjudicators recommended 4 competitors and 5 merited participants (observers) for the Provincial Festival in Ft.St.John this past June 2-6.

Our Festival provides an avenue for young vocalists, instrumentalists, pianists, speech artists, and dancers to showcase their talents in front of live audiences and have their performances adjudicated by professional artists. 3 scholarships were handed out to PSO graduates this year, with the recipients planning on furthering their education in Performing Arts at BC universities.

Once again we thank the District of 100 Mile House for their financial assistance. The District was thanked as Bronze Sponsors in a Thank You ad placed in the 100 Mile Free Press. The name as a Bronze Sponsor was also listed on the Festival website- 100milefestivalofthearts.ca as well as in the official program.

In addition, they were prominently displayed as Bronze Sponsors on the Patron Board which was visible in the lobby throughout the Festival.

To whom it may concern:

The Environmental Assessment Office (EAO) wishes to notify you of its upcoming legislative review of the [Environmental Assessment Act, 2018](#) (the Act). The Act outlines the process for conducting assessments for major projects in British Columbia that are reviewable under the Act and carrying out monitoring, compliance, and enforcement activities on those projects.

As [required by the Act](#), the Minister of Environment and Climate Change Strategy must initiate a review of the Act within five years of the Act coming into force (December 16, 2019). This means the review must begin by December 16, 2024, as seen below:

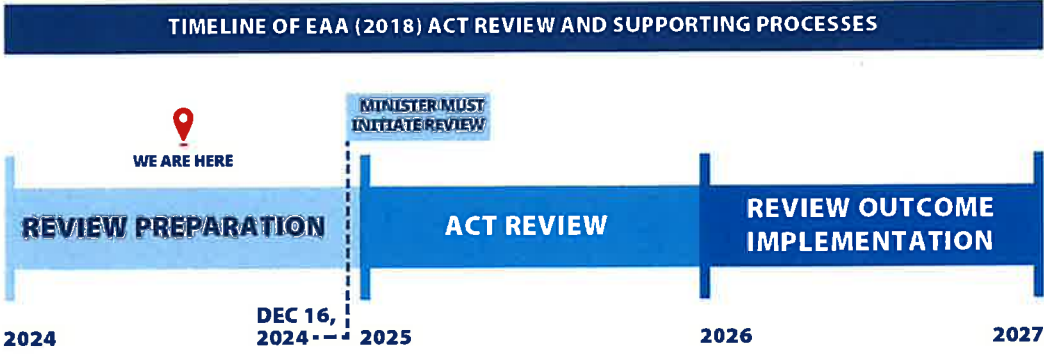


Figure 1: Timeline of the Environmental Assessment Act (2018) Act Review and Supporting Processes.

As part of the review preparation phase, the EAO will be engaging with First Nations, industry associations, and other associations including the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM), to identify potential areas of focus for the review. This initial engagement, which will take place during the summer of 2024, will focus only on issues identification so that the EAO can be sure it understands what the key issues are with the Act. The EAO will not consider making changes to the Act until after the Act Review has begun.

If you would like to notify us of any issue with the Act and/or its regulations that you have identified, please contact UBCM with this information. Once the Act Review has begun, local governments, and all other interested and affected groups, will have the chance to participate in a future round of engagement.

WHEREAS the *BC Hydro and Power Authority Act* and associated statutes references other Acts within its scope, including the *Climate Change Accountability Act* and *Environmental Management Act*. Various communities have experienced that their operations do not fully comply with these Acts or the Provincial Government's Nature-Based 2030 Climate Change targets to protect land, preserve nature, and reverse diversity loss. Moreover, the Authority does not allocate a budget for adequate eco-restoration in areas where its activities have harmfully impacted biodiversity. Financial support is crucial to the success of hydro projects and the realization of provincial climate change targets;

AND WHEREAS to prepare the Province for the impacts of climate change, it is essential that BC Hydro collaborates with local governments, stakeholders, and landowners. The *BC Hydro Power and Authority Act* must also prioritize ecosystem retention in its mandate to provide affordable power while minimizing environmental impact, restoring biodiversity and in the process support local governments' Climate Action Plans;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Union of British Columbia Municipalities recommend the Provincial Government mandate an amendment to the *BC Hydro and Power Authority Act* to incorporate a budget for Climate Change Ecosystem Restoration as well as technologies that support tree retention and/or re-planting in all its projects, thus demonstrating the Provincial Government's commitment to its Nature-Based 2030 Climate Change targets.

Re: Fire Safety Act

I am pleased to share that on August 1, 2024, the Fire Safety Act (FSA) was brought into force, replacing the Fire Services Act.

The FSA, and the associated regulations, will be essential to protecting people and communities through regular fire safety inspections and effective enforcement that will help prevent fire-related tragedies, preserve human life, and reduce property and economic loss due to fires.

The FSA addresses significant advancements in fire protection technology and a deeper understanding of fire behavior since 1979. It was developed and implemented in response to recommendations from BC Coroner's reports and stakeholder feedback to enhance fire safety standards and enforcement.

This legislation is also being implemented after close collaboration with Union of British Columbia Municipalities (UBCM), the Fire Chiefs' Association of BC, regional districts and other key fire service partners. My sincere gratitude to all those who collaborated with the Office of the Fire Commissioner (OFC) to get us to this point.

It is important to note that the FSA meets the B.C. government's commitment to achieve a single standard of fire safety in the province and will:

- enable local authorities to designate personnel to carry out fire inspections and fire investigations and enable local fire services to perform tactical evacuations.
- establish an administrative penalty enforcement model to address non-compliance issues in a more direct, timely and effective manner.
- implement a risk-based approach for fire safety compliance monitoring in municipalities.

During fall 2024 and winter 2025, the OFC will work closely with all partners to ensure a measured implementation of the FSA requirements. In the meantime, please visit [here](#) to review the Q&A on the FSA and other reference documents.

- **R11 2024 Emergency and Disaster Management Act (EDMA) Capacity Funding:** THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the NCLGA and UBCM lobby the Province of British Columbia to commit to providing long-term sustainable capacity funding to municipalities and regional districts to fulfill their emergency management duties, including responsibilities under the *Emergency and Disaster Management Act*.
- **R14 2024 Initial Attack Fire Crew Location:** THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that NCLGA and UBCM lobby the Provincial Government to maintain the Initial Fire Attack Crew Bases in their current locations, and not relocate them without significant local stakeholder consultation.

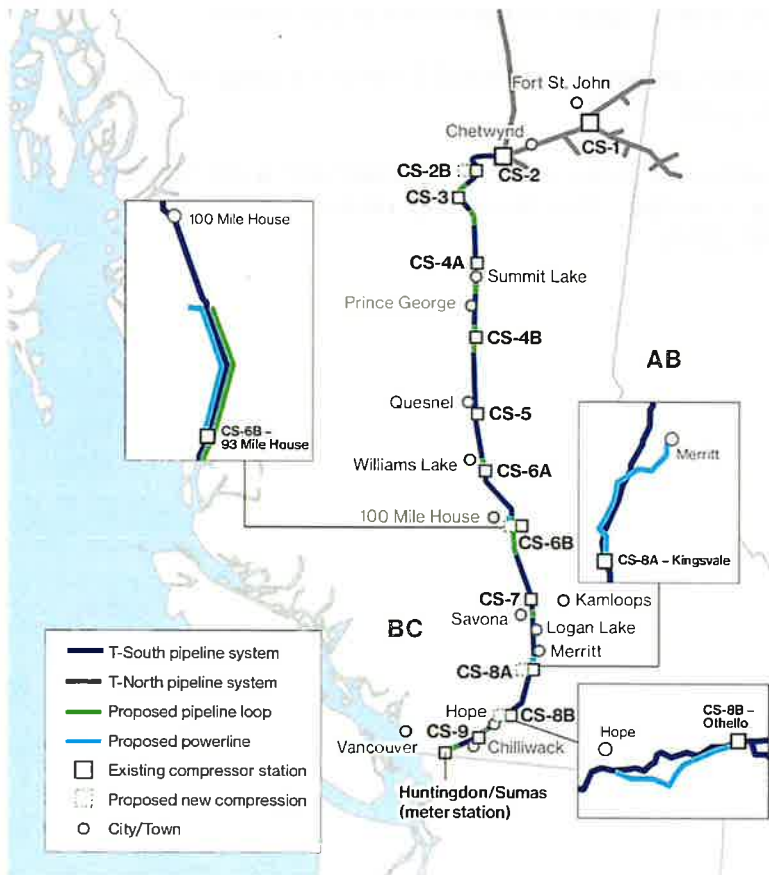

1 Background

On 30 May 2024, Westcoast Energy Inc. (**Westcoast**) filed an application ([C29824](#), [C29826](#), [C29827](#)) for approval to construct and operate the Sunrise Expansion Program (**Project**) pursuant to sections 182, 214, 97, and 226 of the *Canadian Energy Regulator Act* (**CER Act**). The Project is an expansion of Westcoast's existing T-South natural gas system in central and southern British Columbia, with Project work occurring approximately between Chetwynd and Sumas. The Project consists of, among other works:

- approximately 137 kilometres (**km**) of 42-inch diameter natural gas pipeline in 11 pipeline looping segments;
- new electric-driven compressor units and substations at 3 existing compressor stations;
- 3 overhead power line sections totaling approximately 34 km to deliver power to the electric-driven compressor units;

- a new gas-driven compressor unit at a fourth existing compressor station;
- facility upgrades and other work at 11 existing compressor stations and at an existing meter station; and
- temporary construction-related infrastructure (e.g., access roads, contractor yards, construction camps).

Westcoast also seeks various exemptions under the CER Act and the *Canadian Energy Regulator Onshore Pipeline Regulations*, including: exemptions for certain Project components from plan, profile and book of reference requirements; leave-to-open requirements; and non-destructive examination requirements respecting pipeline joints. Westcoast further seeks an order affirming that the Project's costs will be included in the T-South cost of service and tolled on a rolled-in basis.

Westcoast intends to start construction as early as the second quarter of 2026, subject to receiving regulatory approval. Its target Project in-service date is 1 November 2028.

Westcoast's Project application was preceded by a Project Notification filed by Westcoast on 30 January 2024 ([C28231](#)), which triggered the Canada Energy Regulator's (CER) early engagement activities, including those of the Crown Consultation Coordinator (CCC). On 30 May 2024, the CCC filed its Early Engagement Report (Submission #1) describing, among other things, the early engagement activities it conducted with potentially impacted Indigenous¹ communities (EER) ([C29820](#)). On the same day, the CER also filed its Public Early Engagement Summary of Issues (SOI) ([C29811](#)) for the Commission of the CER's consideration.

As of the date of this letter, the Commission has also received:

- a letter dated 13 June 2024 from High Bar First Nation ([C30008](#)), with a follow-up letter dated 23 July 2024 ([C30799](#));
- Westcoast's 20 June 2024 response to High Bar First Nation's initial letter ([C30141](#));
- Westcoast's 20 June 2024 response to the CCC's EER and the CER's Public Early Engagement SOI ([C30140](#));
- a letter dated 5 July 2024 from the CCC, providing an update to the Crown list for the Project ([C30586](#));
- a Summary of the 26 June 2024 Sunrise Expansion Program Project Application Information Session from the CCC, dated 22 July 2024 ([C30791](#)) (Submission #2); and

The Commission is currently assessing whether Westcoast's application is complete, such that it can proceed to assessment, having regard to comments received on this issue. At this time, the Commission has sufficient information to assess next steps. Through this letter, the Commission is issuing the notice of public hearing and commencing the registration to participate process. A separate communication will be issued in due course with respect to completeness (which may include a completeness determination or process steps prior to a determination), as well as additional process steps.

If the Commission finds that Westcoast has provided a complete application, it will hold a public hearing and obtain evidence from the public and Indigenous Peoples that register to participate as intervenors, as well as those who submit letters of comment. The Commission will communicate details about its process, including certain hearing steps and deadlines, at that time.

2 Hearing participation

Intervenors and commenters

Those participating in any hearing can do so in one of two ways:

A **commenter** may share their views with the Commission in a letter of comment. They cannot be asked questions about their letter of comment, nor can they ask questions about Westcoast's or intervenors' written evidence, or provide argument. Commenters are **not** eligible for participant funding.

An **intervenor** may, among other things, file written evidence, ask questions about Westcoast's and other intervenors' evidence, and provide argument in accordance with the hearing timeline. An intervenor that files written evidence must answer any questions asked about their evidence. Intervenors **may be** eligible for participant funding (see **Section 3** below).

Any member of the public may share their views on the Project by filing a letter of comment during the hearing. Commenters do **not** need to register but may sign up in the Participation Portal (linked to below) to be notified by email when the commenting period opens.

Anyone planning to participate in the hearing as an intervenor must register online through the CER's Participation Portal. Registration will be available from **1 August until 29 August 2024**. The Participation Portal is found at the following link: <http://www.cer-rec.gc.ca/participate>.

Given that a person's participation should correspond with the degree to which they may be impacted by the Project, with the exception of Indigenous Peoples potentially impacted by the Project, those registering to be intervenors must describe:

- how their interests may be impacted by the Project;
- what information they will provide to the Commission; and
- why they require intervenor status.

Indigenous Peoples who are potentially impacted by the Project (including those on the CCC's Crown list for the Project) do not need to justify their request to participate as intervenors.² This is the case even if they register **after** the deadline. In the event of a late registration, participation will however be limited to process steps that occur after registration. The Commission encourages early registration to maximize participation opportunities.

The Commission acknowledges comments in the EER that the term "intervenor" can be negatively perceived. All participants – including intervenors – play an important and valuable role in helping the Commission identify areas of concern with a proposed project, as well as potential solutions to those concerns, among other things.

After the registration process closes, the Commission will issue a ruling confirming all intervenors for any hearing that may be held. In future correspondence, the Commission will communicate details about the various process steps that intervenors may undertake. More information about the roles of intervenors and commenters is found on the CER's website.³

Crown Consultation Coordinator

The CER Act establishes the CER as an agent of the Crown. The Commission and the CCC are both part of the CER. Where there are Crown consultation responsibilities, the CER will consult with Indigenous Peoples while striving to build meaningful relationships with those who might be affected by CER-regulated facilities.⁴

If the Commission finds the application complete, and a hearing is held regarding the Project, the Commission's project assessment and hearing processes will be the primary forum for Crown consultation with Indigenous Peoples. The Supreme Court of Canada has acknowledged that the National Energy Board, now the Commission, has the procedural powers to implement consultation and the remedial powers to impose and enforce accommodation measures.

While Crown consultation is undertaken primarily by the Commission, the CCC conducts early and supplemental consultation activities for certain projects (including this Project). The CCC works independently from the Commission, remains neutral in its interactions about proposed projects, seeks to understand potential impacts to the rights and interests of Indigenous Peoples, and discusses and develops potential mitigations, recommendations, and potential accommodation measures. The CCC will also work as necessary with other federal departments to determine how any issues or concerns raised by Indigenous Peoples that may involve other areas of federal responsibility can be addressed.

The Commission is mindful of the CCC's Suggestion #5 in the EER regarding its hearing participation.⁵ The CCC will have opportunities – in a manner to be established by the

Commission – to participate in process steps and provide information with respect to its consultation activities on the hearing record.

3 Participant funding

Participant funding is available to facilitate the participation of eligible intervenors, including:

- Indigenous Peoples (regardless of whether they are involved in the CCC's Crown consultation activities);
- individuals (such as landowners); and
- non-industry not-for-profit groups with a direct local interest or expertise on the anticipated effects of the Project.

Indigenous Peoples participating in Crown consultation activities may already have funding agreements in place and do **not** need to reapply after registering as intervenors.

The funding application form is found on the CER's website⁶ and applications must be sent by email to pfp.pafp@cer-rec.gc.ca **on or before 29 August 2024**. Funding determinations will be communicated after the Commission confirms intervenors for any potential hearing.

The Commission acknowledges concerns raised by Indigenous Peoples in CCC Submission #2,⁷ and questions from the public in the SOI, about participant funding. However, decisions regarding participant funding are outside of the Commission's mandate and, as noted above, the CER's participant funding is independent of the Commission and the CCC. Questions about participant funding can be sent to the email address noted above.

4 Notice of public hearing

A notice of public hearing (**Notice**) is provided in **Appendix 1**.

The Commission directs Westcoast to undertake the following:

- 1) **No later than 2 August 2024** – Distribute a copy of the Notice and this letter to the following:
 - Westcoast's list of potentially affected landowners along the proposed Project route;
 - Westcoast's list of interested persons;
 - all municipalities and first responders likely to be impacted by the Project;
 - all Indigenous Peoples engaged by Westcoast, or otherwise on the Crown list for the Project; and
 - all persons listed in **Appendix 2** of this letter.

- 2) **No later than 2 August 2024** – Post the Notice on Westcoast's Project website.
- 3) **No later than 16 August 2024** – Publish the Notice in the publications listed, and in the manner as directed, in **Appendix 3**. The Notice must meet the requirements of the Government of Canada's Federal Identity Program. Further information is available on the CER's website.⁸
- 4) **No later than 23 August 2024** – File with the CER a complete list describing to whom the Notice was distributed, the dates when it was distributed, and the methods of distribution, as well as the dates, methods, and analytics (for digital only) by which the Notice was published.

Vernon background for resolution submission to UBCM:

Throughout our province we are all living with the devastating impacts of fires and floods, which are made worse by climate change. Burning fossil fuels is the major cause of climate change. Today we are all reliant on gasoline, diesel, and natural gas. However, the transition to a low or zero-carbon future is underway, led by higher levels of government in Canada and around the world. This transition will take several years, and there will be challenges to overcome along the way. The transition will be costly, but less costly than the ongoing and worsening impacts of climate change, and it will require sustained leadership from all levels of government.

In B.C. we have a better alternative to burning fossil fuels. BC Hydro produces much cleaner renewable electricity and has plans to accommodate the additional demand that will result from broad-based electrification. The fossil fuel industry is competing against electrification. Their best efforts to become "sustainable" will not substantially reduce their greenhouse gas emissions. Their primary objective is self-preservation, rather than helping us prepare for the future. Their messaging at our conventions promotes complacency among us. This messaging is not helpful – instead we need to be acting boldly and doing more to prepare for the electrified future. The City of Vernon respectfully requests SILGA and UBCM members' consideration of this resolution.

DISTRICT OF 100 MILE HOUSE

Bylaw No. 1427

Being a bylaw to establish a Board of Variance and its procedures

The Council of the District of 100 Mile House, in open meeting assembled, enacts as follows:

1. Citation

This bylaw may be cited for all purposes as "District of 100 Mile House Board of Variance Bylaw No. 1427, 2024."

2. Definitions

1) In this bylaw:

"**Board**" means the District of 100 Mile House Board of Variance

"**Chair**" means the Chair of the Board of Variance

"**Corporate Officer**" means the Corporate Officer of the District of 100 Mile House

"**Council**" means the Municipal Council of the District of 100 Mile House

"**District**" means the District of 100 Mile House

"**Member**" means a member of the Board of Variance

"**Secretary**" means the Secretary to the Board of Variance appointed under this bylaw

3. Appointment of Board Members

- 1) The Board shall consist of three members appointed by Council for a three-year term each.
- 2) The Board must elect one of their members as Chair and the Chair may appoint an acting Chair in the absence of the elected Chair.
- 3) A person who is a Councillor, a member of the planning committee, or an officer or employee of the District is not eligible to be appointed to the Board.

4. Vacancies

- 1) In the event a member ceases to hold office, a successor shall be appointed by Council, and until the appointment, the remaining members constitute the Board of Variance.

5. Secretary

- 1) The Corporate Officer or their designate will be the Secretary of the Board of Variance.
- 2) The Secretary will carry out the duties assigned under this Bylaw and by the Board of Variance.

6. Applications to the Board of Variance

- 1) A person may apply to the Board of Variance by:
 - (a) Submitting to the Secretary a written application that is signed by the applicant and that contains:
 - i. the legal description and civic address that is the subject of the application;
 - ii. a site plan indicating the requested variance;
 - iii. the evidence and arguments on which the application is based;
 - iv. the relief sought;
 - v. the address to which the notice of the hearing should be mailed;
 - vi. any other information that the applicant intends to present to the Board at the hearing; and
 - (b) Paying the applicable fee prescribed in the District of 100 Mile House Fees and Charges Bylaw No. 1409, 2023 as amended or substituted from time to time.
- 2) Upon receiving an application, the Secretary of the Board must notify the Chair of the Board of Variance of the application as soon as practicable.
- 3) The Chair must set a time, date, and place for the Board of Variance to conduct a hearing of the application.

7. Notices

- 1) At least 10 days before the date set for a hearing, the Board of Variance, through the Secretary, will mail or deliver a notice of the hearing to the last known address of the following persons:
 - i. the applicant;
 - ii. the owners and tenants occupying the land that is the subject of the application;
 - iii. the owners and tenants occupying land that is adjacent to the land that is the subject of the application;
 - iv. the District of 100 Mile House Planning department;
 - v. the Building Inspector or their designate; and
 - vi. each member of the Board of Variance.

- 2) A notice of hearing must state:
 - i. the subject matter of the application;
 - ii. the time, date and place the application will be heard; and
 - iii. if the meeting at which the application is heard is conducted by means of electronic or other communication facilities, the way in which the meeting is to be conducted by those means.

8. **Conduct of Hearing**

- 1) A quorum for the Board of Variance is (2) members, one of whom must be the Chair or designated Chair.
- 2) If a quorum is not present within 15 minutes after the scheduled time of a hearing, then the hearing will be deemed to have been cancelled and the Chair must set a new time, date and place for the Board to conduct a hearing of the application.
- 3) Any person or body with interest in property within the District is entitled to be heard at the hearing.
- 4) Evidence at a hearing may be given orally or in writing.
- 5) The Board of Variance may receive written submissions and hear oral submissions with respect to an application only during the hearing at which the application is considered.
- 6) The Board of Variance will permit submissions to be presented at a hearing in the following order:
 - i. the applicant;
 - ii. the Corporate Officer or their designate;
 - iii. the Building Inspector or their designate; and
 - iv. all other parties with an interest in the application in the sequence directed by the Chair until all such parties have been given a reasonable opportunity to present their submissions.
- 7) The Board may view the property affected by the application and surrounding properties. The Board may adjourn the hearing from time to time and may reconvene without further notice if the time, date, and place of reconvening is announced at adjournment.
- 8) The Secretary must record and keep minutes of the Board of Variance's proceedings.
- 9) The minutes of the Board of Variance's proceedings must be signed by the Chair.

9. **Decisions**

- 1) The Board of Variance may proceed to decide an application if the applicant fails to appear at the hearing.

- 2) The decision of the Board to either grant or deny an order must be made by a motion adopted by the majority of the Board members present at the meeting.
- 3) All members of the Board of Variance are voting members and any member who abstains from voting will be deemed to have voted in favour of the motion.
- 4) In the event that the members of the Board are equally divided in their votes for and against a motion, it will be disposed of in the negative.
- 5) Decisions of the Board of Variance will be filed with the Secretary and available for public inspection at the District of 100 Mile House municipal office during normal business hours.
- 6) The Secretary will mail or deliver a copy of the Board of Variance's decision to the last known address of those persons who were entitled to notice of the hearing and to any other person indicated by the Board.
- 7) The Board must not re-hear an appeal covering the identical grounds or principles upon which the Board has previously rendered a decision.
- 8) A decision of the Board is final and may only be overturned by the Supreme Court of Canada.

10. **Expenses**

- 1) No member of the Board of Variance shall receive compensation for his or her services other than allowances for actual expenses necessarily incurred in the discharge of official duties.

11. **Severability**

- 1) If any part of this bylaw is for any reason held to be invalid by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this bylaw.

12. **Repeals**

- 1) Board of Variance Bylaw No. 593, 1993 is hereby repealed.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION / DISCUSSION:

During the 2024 budget process, Council asked that the cemetery fees be reviewed to ensure that the rates were sufficient enough to pay for the costs associated with maintaining the cemetery.

A survey was completed using municipalities from 1000-10,000 in population and an average median was established. The new rates listed in Schedule "A" reflect this median.

Resident rates increased approximately 30%, non resident rates increased approximately 80%, disinterment/exhumation rates increased approximately 10% and columbarium rates increased approximately 13%. Oversized adult liners and winter burial rates have been added to the fee schedule as well.

Although the suggested new rates do not cover the average maintenance costs, if the average sales remain the same, they should come close. In order to recoup the total average maintenance costs the increase in rates could be as high as 20-25% over median.
